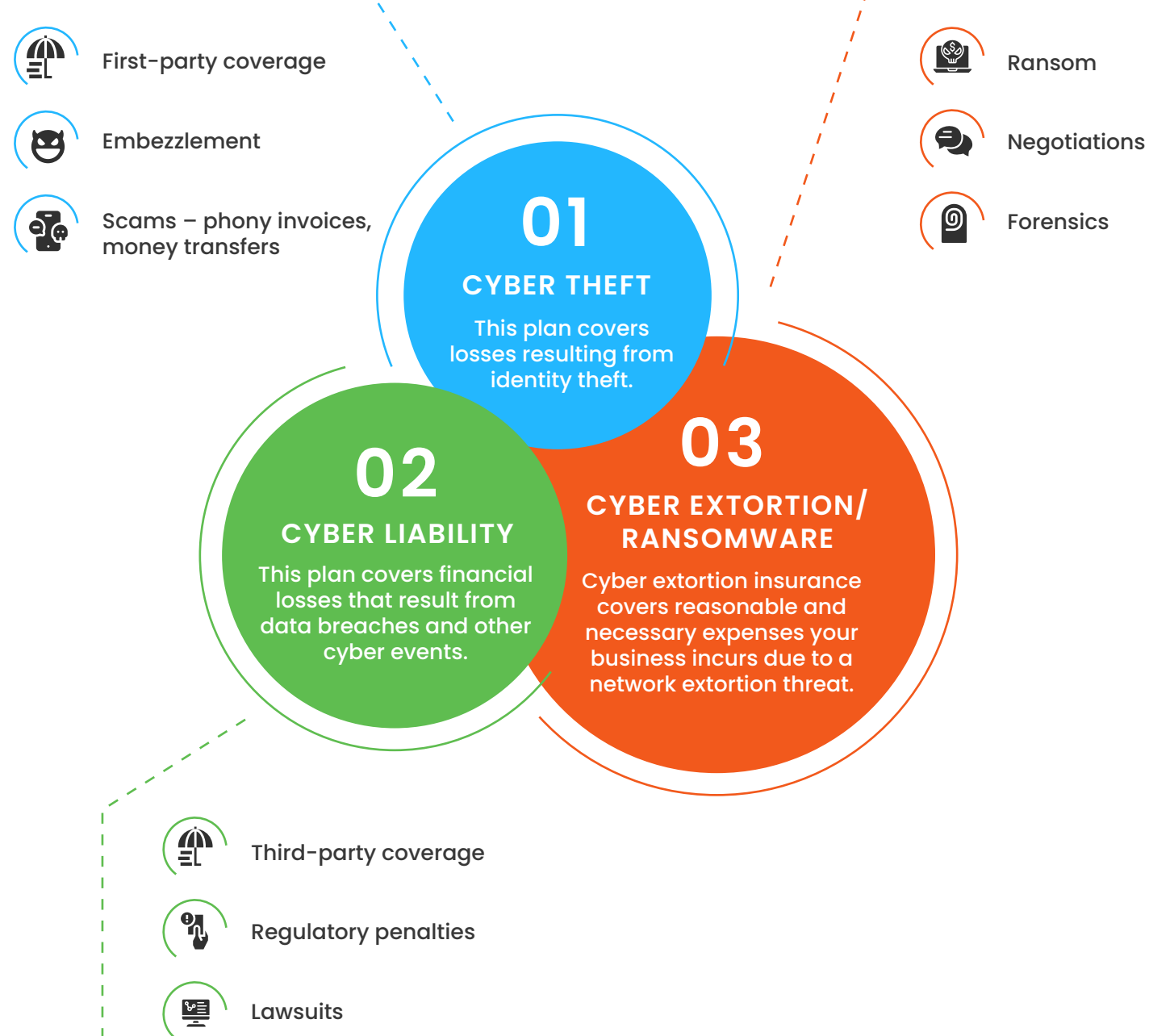
Some companies skip out on top-notch security measures assuming that cyber insurance will cover their costs in the event of a catastrophe. This simply isn't true.
